
20 Shows & Movies Coming To Netflix In July

That new <u>trailer</u> got us <u>so hyped</u>. Eleven closed the door to the Upside Down on Season 2, but apparently the monsters are still in Hawkins ready to wreak havoc. That release date can't possibly come fast enough. Sorry, America, we'll be too busy binge-watching Netflix to watch any fireworks or parades that day.

There's no doubt we'll have *Stranger Things* finished after about a day, so thankfully it's not the only new thing coming to Netflix in July. The month will be jam packed with Netflix Original shows and movies, as well as some other favorites that aren't originals. Here are 20 shows and movies coming to Netflix in July that we can't wait to binge and give us good reason to stay in out of the summer heat.

The Hangover

The 2009 instant comedy classic *The Hangover* will be available for streaming on Netflix on *July 1st*. The misadventures of a group of friends (*Bradley Cooper, Zach Galifianakis*, and *Ed Helms*) after a drunken night is almost relatable, if not for the tiger, baby, police cruiser, and of course, Mike Tyson. Then there's the fact that the friends seemed to misplace the groom, whose bachelor party they got a little too drunk at, on the day of his wedding.

JJ Abrams's 2008 found-footage monster film *Cloverfield*, which eventually sparked a franchise followed by 10 *Cloverfield Lane* in 2016 and *The Cloverfield Paradox* in 2018, will be available on Netflix on July 1st. The movie follows six New York residents attempting to escape a monster that's attacking the city. The monster is 25 stories tall, able to survive missiles, and destroys both the Brooklyn Bridge and the Statue of Liberty. That's kinda terrifying.

Charlie and the Chocolate Factory

Tim Burton's 2005 film Charlie and the Chocolate Factory, starring Johnny Depp as Willy Wonka and Freddie Highmore as the titular Charlie Bucket, will be available to stream on Netflix on July 1st. The movie is the second adaptation of Roald Dahl's classic children's book, after the 1971 Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory, starring Gene Wilder. The Oompa Loompas are slightly less creepy in the 2005 version, and the songs are more updated and modern, but it's arguable that Depp's Wonka is more bizarre. Can't expect much else from Tim Burton.

Good Witch: Season 4

Good Witch is a Hallmark Channel fantasy-comedy-drama about, you guessed it, a witch, Cassie Nightingale, and her teenage daughter, Grace. Cassie was the protagonist of seven TV movies before the series started in 2015. Season five is currently airing on Hallmark now, while season four will be available to stream on Netflix on **July 2nd**.

Stranger Things: Season 3

Stranger Things season three is supposedly the biggest and best season yet, which is why we had to wait so long since the last installment in October 2017. In the Dark is the latest drama from the CW, first airing in April this year, and coming to Netflix on July 5th. Ben Stiller is an executive producer of the show, and the CW already renewed it for a second season, so it's probably worth the binge.

Mary Poppins Returns

The 2018 follow-up to Disney's 1964 classic musical fantasy *Mary Poppins* — *Mary Poppins* — *Returns*, starring *Emily Blunt* — will be available for streaming on Netflix on *July 9th*. Mary Poppins has not aged a day, but she's back decades later to help the Banks' yet again, this time all grown up and with kids of their own. With all the adventure and magical whimsy of the original, plus new songs, the film also stars *Lin-Manuel Miranda* and *Ben Whishaw*.

Point Blank

Netflix has remade the 2010 action film *Point Blank*, this time starring **Frank Grillo** and **Anthony Mackie**, who you know as Falcon from the Marvel Cinematic Universe, and it will be released on **July 12**. For those not familiar with the original film, an ER nurse teams up with a career criminal in order to save his pregnant wife from corrupt cops.

The Princess and the Frog

Disney's animated *The Princess and the Frog* from 2009 is a retelling of the classic fairytale *The Frog Prince* with a 1920s New Orleans spin. Tiana is saving money to open her own restaurant, and when she meets a cursed Prince Naveen, she kisses him and turns into a frog herself as well. Tiana and Naveen go on an adventure to try to become human again, and as this is a Disney movie, of course they fall in love and are able to break the curse, as well as open a restaurant together. It's adorable. How could it not be? It'll be available for streaming on Netflix on **July 16**.

Wynonna Earp: Season 3

Syfy renewed the show for season four at San Diego Comic Con in 2018, but production was delayed and still hasn't been filmed. 

At the start of the show, we follow Bea Smith as she's sent to Wentworth for the attempted murder of her husband. She not only learns to survive in prison, but makes her way to the top of the food chain. However, Bea left the show after season four, so it has since followed the lives of multiple inmates. Season seven will be available on Netflix on **July 31**.

The Red Sea Diving Resort
